

## **BIG ISLAND ORDNANCE REMOVAL**

### KYW-CBS PHILADELPHIA, PA 6 A.M.

Anchor: An explosive problem on Hawaii's Big Island has ordnance removal crews working overtime. Their job, to remove thousands of grenades and other explosives left over from World War II training. The crews have been walking the island with metal detectors trying to find the sometimes buried munitions. The problem is so bad the Army Corps of Engineers estimates the total cost of removal at \$600 million.

### FOX-NETWORK 11 A.M.

Uma Pemmaraju Anchor: Some leftovers from World War II are causing an explosive situation on the Big Island of Hawaii. Ordnance crews are searching tens of thousands of acres for unexploded munitions. Five grenades were blown up yesterday behind two schools. They're leftovers from Marine Corps training that took place there during World War II

### FOX-NETWORK 3 P.M.

Anchor: Some leftovers from World War II are causing an explosive situation on the Big Island of Hawaii. Ordnance crews are searching tens of thousands of acres for unexploded munitions. ### FOX-NETWORK 6 P.M.

Shepard Smith Anchor: Hawaii. More than half a century after World War II crews are still searching for and finding live ordnance. Just this week they detonated five old grenades near a school. They were left over from Marine Corps training during the war. The feds are now spending \$10 million dollars a year to clean up exploded munitions.
