

**ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS FINDS UNEXPLODED ORDNANCE
ON THE BIG ISLAND**

Jade Moon:
Anchor Clean-up crews on the Big Island found more unexploded ordnance this morning near Waimea. Contractors with the Army Corps of Engineers discovered a live grenade and an 81-millimeter mortar round. Last month workers found five live grenades just behind the Waimea Intermediate and Elementary Schools. The explosives are leftovers from a World War II training camp and are detonated on site. The Army Corps of Engineers says it is finding much more unexploded ordnance than it had expected when it started the cleanup work earlier this year. The 50-million dollar cleanup is the largest of its kind in the United States.
